## PRUNING AND SOUP DAY (LUNCH)

**SATURDAY 30<sup>th</sup> JULY from 9.30am onwards**

One of our most popular days!! It would be great to have some of you who are not too experienced or who know nothing about pruning heritage roses to come along and join in the camaraderie on the day. It really is full of fun, at the same time achieving a 'must do' task without hassle. There is someone always on hand to help if you don't know how to prune a rose. It's wonderful practice because then you can tackle your own roses with greater knowledge! Remember these are heritage roses and therefore are not pruned in the same style as a hybrid tea. Watch someone who is experienced first and then give it a go. Ask as many questions as needed as it's better than going ahead unaware.

The roses last spring looked absolutely beautiful after we were able to prune all the roses in winter.

What to bring:

Your lovely clean and ever so sharp secateurs and hardy gloves (a broom or rake can also come in handy) and you're ready to go. If you really don't want to prune (and some of us don't), 'roustabouts' are always most welcome to rake up and dispose of the prunings and do a little weeding along the way.

Also don't forget your sunhat and suntan lotion (it may be winter but the sun can still have an affect on the skin).

After all that exhausting work, it's time for our SOUP LUNCH.



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**A REVIEW OF OUR JUNE MEETING**  
**A talk on "DAMASK, BOURBONS, CENTIFOLIA AND GALLICAS"**

It may be winter-time, but that did not stop members from coming to our meeting on the talk of 'Damask, Bourbons, Centifolia and Gallica Roses', a very interesting and informative talk given by Jan.

She gave us an insight into these different types of roses that grow in her garden with examples in photos and where was most suitable place to plant, such as background, centre or front of the garden or best in pots.

Some suggestions from the different types:

Bourbon – 'Souvenir de la Malmaison – background, Souvenir de St Anne's (a sport of the former) – a good container and a sweet little rose, 'Mme Ernst Calvert' – a 'must' for your garden, 'Mme Isaac Periere – vigorous, but with a beautiful perfume. These two need support along a fence etc.

Centifolias – which equals 100 petals (a good quiz question!). They are best in cold European gardens like the Netherlands. They do not repeat and are all shades of pink. There were around 180 varieties but few are now in existence. A good example is the 'Everywhere Rose' a soft pink that does sucker and 'Cristata' which is very prickly.

Damask – This rose is the best for 'Pot Pouri'

These roses have the most amazing perfume, but also a lot of Gallica in their make-up with their vicious fine prickles. Among them are 'Quatre Saisons' (4 seasons) a pink, 'Kazanlik-Trigintipetala' from the middle-east used for perfume oil, 'Isphan' a pink, 'Madame Hardy' pure white with a lovely strong scent and very upright, just to name a few of these glorious roses that do very well in Perth climate

Gallicas – from France. There were over 2,000 listed but most are lost today and they are very prickly and twiggy. These plants do struggle in Perth's hot summers. Most are deep magenta/purple in colour. Amongst this section in Jan's garden is 'Cardinal de Richelieu', 'La Belle Sultane' and 'Orpheline de Juillet'.

Di followed with 'a chat' on a couple of books from the Library which related to Jan's talk.

"Historical Roses" by Hella Brummer and Eilike Vemmer (No. 43 in the Library) – Roses from 'Sangerhausen' in Germany. A really good book full of photos of the different types of heritage roses.

“The Graham Stuart Thomas Rose Book” by Graham Stuart Thomas (No.30 in the Library) – a must read for the story of a man and his love of old roses. He was the man behind the restoration of Montisfont Gardens in England.

Di finished by mentioning that the Library was not used enough which is a shame as it’s a very good Library on heritage roses, people and places.
